Report of the Chairman on YCC activities in 2009

It's been a record year in the YCC history – we topped 351 members, out of these 333 are registered as "active". If I were a president of a big NYSE quoted company a big bonus would probably be on its way. In a sailing club run solely by volunteers these impressive figures lead to more challenges for many of us and the rewards will only come next seasons – when these new members will hopefully continue with us and pass their experience to the next generation of newcomers. This year brought questions about the limits to the size of the Club and the capacity for coaching 101 (!) new members by the limited number of really active experienced ones.

In this publication you will find how we coped with this challenge, especially in Paul's courses report. If you are surprised reading these impressive figures, it might mean that we did not communicate too much this season. Times are changing and the new pace of life makes it hard to be on time with traditional News. We have become completely e-mail dependent, the newer members probably don't even remember that a few years ago everyone was getting a big paper envelope with the annual info and the YCC was contributing to deforestation. This is over now, all is via the e-mail, our active blog backed web and yes, the new YouTube channel with very professional films of Matt – where one can really catch the atmosphere of the Versoix events.

Last year, during the 40th Anniversary party, I mentioned the uniqueness of our Club. Certainly most of you will agree with me, it is a unique place in Geneva, bringing hundreds of sailing and windsurfing enthusiasts together, letting them improve their skills, providing boats (of all tastes and sizes!) that we would not be able to buy individually, but also a place where one can integrate in the region and meet new friends. It's not only the Club assets that are attractive, but also its spirit. Preserving this has been one of my great concerns and making sure we can continue with our *low fees plus a bit of everyone's time* model has been my big preoccupation.

Four years ago with Sebastian we introduced the concept of expanding the burden of regatta organization onto all regular participants on a rotating basis. Then Rob and Luca suggested that all crews be involved in the cruise preparation. This year I asked you to help with the fleet maintenance: the reply was great and the new boats responsible named person supported by a team on e-mail call was introduced. I would really like to thank all of you that have replied to my hopes and then assumed their roles, especially Lars whose mail I got within three minutes of the call and Maarten who was there even before I asked for help. I am convinced that this massive participation in helping the Club by spreading the responsibilities onto all of us is the way forward!

I remember that some 6 years ago the club fees were slightly increased as the then Committee was very much concerned with the ability of regular fleet renewal. With my two treasurers: first Luigi, then Johannes, we have managed to maintain these fees and additionally find more savings by controlling the expenses. I know that sometimes it was tough and maybe one or two additional sails or maintenance jobs could have been ordered. Overall, I am very happy to say that we did prove that our economic model is viable and we are able to replace of the order of 1-2 boats worth some 40'000 CHF on average each year – including replacing the cruiser so much discussed in the past and - why not – buying a brand new Surprise!

The nay-sayers might complain that our Surprises are less seen in the external events and that the annual M-R has seen fewer participants. I'd say that our keel-boat sailors have simply reached a certain level of maturity. What used to be a real problem when I first joined the Committee – numerous accidents often causing serious material damage - have become a thing of the past. There was not a single accident the last four years. We should still stay vigilant: two near misses with falling masts were reported this year by the dinghy fans. If we don't participate so often in the external regattas, many members eagerly

subscribe and participate in the organized Surprise regatta training lead by our renowned sailors: Thierry and Remy, and yes despite the cold we are there on the *Hivernals*. So after juvenile enthusiasm, it's a more mature, more structured phase, which might now change with the new acquisition. For the Surprise has remained the most widely used regatta class on the Geneva Lake.

Several years ago the dinghies were hardly used. It has required a lot of effort from Jonathan, John, Sarah, Reiner, Mario and more recently Alex and Jan Fiete as well as many other teachers to change this trend. In 2009 quite a few dinghy sailors made it to the external regattas, six even went to the *Atomiade* in Berlin, where one team made it to the podium. For many years the dinghies and catamarans were sailed a lot on organised events, this year finally they started being used just as the Ynglings – by our sailors on their own. I popped up a few times in late hours to Versoix. Whoever says the Club social life is in decline is wrong, the *Buvette* was always filled with happy dinghy sailors discussing their accomplishments. Yes, today dinghy sailing has definitely become fashionable!

I was happy to have been able to contribute to it at least in one little way – by obtaining an additional ground place allowing the Club to buy a new dinghy and thus expand from six to seven, out of which 4 are less than 5 years old!

Four years have passed since I accepted the helm of the YCC. Over this period the Club continued its activities with a huge YCC presence in Versoix for sailing, courses, regattas. New ideas saw light: tall-ship Atlantic cruise, documentary videos, new courses, enlarged participation of the members in maintenance and regatta organization, structured regatta training etc.

Figure-wise the Club is in full expansion. The membership number that has oscillated the last years slightly below 300 has risen to a record 351 this year. We observe a generation renewal, while maintaining a considerable fraction of experienced members - last year at the 40th Anniversary Party, beautifully prepared by Danielle, all ages were present! The Club bought six new boats for all tastes: a cruiser, three factory-new dinghies, a catamaran and this year a brand new Surprise - thanks Michał for piloting this acquisition! With these large investments, the Club still has some 85 k CHF on the accounts – 25 k more than 4 years ago.

However, the Club is not about figures or spending money; it is about spending time – time sailing, competing, organising, repairing boats, having a friendly chat in Versoix etc. Time, that I simply no longer have - both for private and professional reasons. Although I have been greatly seconded by many Committee and Club members, with my new family commitments I will not be able to give the YCC the attention which it requires for the next season and thus I do not intend to stand for re-election. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank especially my closest collaborators; overall 29 people have been on one of "my Committees" and if there is no space to list all of them here (but you can find them in this and the previous Annual Reports) it is worth mentioning at least those that have started with Gigi and Marco and stayed all these years providing me with lots of experienced help: Elena, Gennaro, Gijs, John, Rob, Sascha, Stefano and Tim.

A few months ago we discussed a possible candidature with three young and dynamic Committee members in order to assure continuation and at the same time bring new ideas. I am happy to announce that Alex has agreed to stand for election and I sincerely hope that he will benefit from your support as much as I used to!





Over the winter our two lasers were given a lot of TLC, making their hulls look as new in BA5. Thank you very much for the people who helped. This winter it is planned to work on the ISO hull.

During the sailing season we were blessed with great winds all the way until September, when the season came to an end sadly for us and with deep regret from North Sails.

It started with the Opening Regatta, in which 6 dinghies participated, in all the internal regattas we managed to have a high turnout of dinghies. In fact, only one regatta, the Drag Race, had to be cancelled in September due to low winds.

This year with the collaboration of the CNV we had an extra 30 students over our normal 16 (dinghy). This caused quite an overload to our instructors and testers, plus the administration behind the scenes, but with a number of extra events we just managed to cope. To help manage with this an additional RS 500 was bought at the end of the season.

It was great to see the dinghy usage going up over the weekend: we have been trying to do this for the last five years.

We now have a club dinghy trailer on Swiss plates, which will hopefully help more people to do external regattas.

Since we are on the subject of dinghies and regattas, Sarah kindly contributed a personal view:

43rd Bol d'Or - Lac de Joux version

Many dinghy sailors already know of the much-travelled RS 400 *Babe*: apart from sailing a great deal around Port Choiseul, she is good enough to take Sarah and John to many far-flung places, the Lac de Joux, and once to the Isle of Wight Solent because she fancied salt-water regattas. Sarah reports "The 43rd Bol d'Or took place on Sunday 23rd August 2009 on the Lac de Joux. A NE breeze of between 5 to 15 knots blew with beautiful weather. We participated in our RS400 *Babe* with the other 79 dinghies, 52

multi-hulls and 9 hydrofoil Moths (see the photo). The event was amazing and was held in great spirits, we arrived 47th after completing two laps of the course, which was nonetheless challenging. A date certainly to be marked in the sailing calendar for 2010!" Note that *Babe* is much too modest to offer you a photo of herself, so here are Moths.

Catamarans

One of the last times I saw Marleen, she was busy talking her way out of a parking ticket in Port Choiseul: most members will now know of those cunning new parking places just adjacent to our launch ramp designed to entrap you ... Marleen was busy filling two of them, tow vehicle and trailer bearing a dismantled catamaran (back together again now, you'll be glad to learn). And chatting up the nice policeman, who did believe her, that she would move both as soon as we had finished launching the Tuesday fleet. The point is, she had just returned from an exciting weekend on Lake Como with her cat', showing the locals how we do it! She reports -

Hobie Europeans 2009 - Lake Como

This year I figured it was time for some personal improvement, and thought the best way of doing that was by going to a European Championship for Hobie Fx 1.

Relatively new to the class, as this is the third season I've sailed this boat; you can imagine I was slightly worried to learn that usual wind conditions on Lake Como are 4-5 Beaufort. But as a seasoned regatta sailor I also knew that the best place to learn is in championships where you have nothing to lose and have literally to 'work your butt off to keep up with the last' :-)

It turned out that all the other Fx 1 competitors were relatively tall and heavier men, so I stood out in the crowd and, more, had to take lead to make the minimum weight. They were all very curious how such a little girl would handle the same boat they were having trouble controlling, I just kept on smiling and saying that actually I didn't really know because we never have Beaufort force 4-5 in Geneva...



Some people sail my boat with 2, which allows them a jib. I assume if you are married and want to take your spouse out on a Sunday this will be fine, but why sail it like that in regattas - wouldn't it be called a Fx-two if that had been the purpose? In the end I (and the other solo sailors) were proven correct that there is no point, as even I managed to beat the double-up boats (there were only 2) quite a few times.

My ambition for the races was to not come last at the end of the week, which I managed easily, despite the very strong competition. The first races I did end up 'best of the last' with a rather big gap between me and the guys in front. But we (the last) quickly caught up and managed to reduce the gap already on the second day, and up to no more gaps by the last days of the week. I remained the 'best of the last' by finally finishing 9th out of 14, but in the last few races the front guys felt the heat, as I managed to round 1st windward mark in 5th position the last race.

Apart from a broken joystick (tiller to you dinghy people) nothing broke - especially not morale ;-) ! I was reminded of how much fun racing really is, how much fun it is to have a beer with like-minded people after a good day of racing, how exciting it is when you sail to your best ability and sometimes have to take your penalty turns, how fantastic it is to sail against other boats that are exactly the same as yours, how great it is to have steady winds of Beaufort 4-5 and most of all how cool it is to have a dad who is still able to sail the same championship on a Hobie 16 (thank god it is a different fleet because for sure he would have beaten me, had it been the same class).



There is not a lot to say about our GibSea, *Gypsy*, this season, although she had a busy one! A considerable amount of maintenance work is planned this winter, so we can report on that in due course. In the meantime, still on the smaller boats front, a report from Marleen van Nes, equally intrepid down in Greece, with -

The year 2009 has been particularly fruitful for the YCC Surprises – we have finalised the long-awaited acquisition and a brand new Surprise joined our fleet. Buying directly from the vendor, we had the luxury to choose the equipment options that we found important for the club. The boat was delivered in September and already in September it was made available for the general club use. The boat is immaculate, so please put your seamanship to good use and help us keep it in this state! Speaking of our other Surprises, 2 new gauge spinnakers and 1 new "bol-d'or" type big spinnaker were bought at the beginning of the season. Regatta training started at the end of May and carried on until mid-August, which admittedly restricted the availability of the Surprises for leisure outings, but allowed new crews to form before external regattas. Mooring places in Port Choiseul being as limited as they are, in September we had to take Miss Match out of the water to free up the place for the new boat, which will stay in the water over winter, ready for winter regattas and the Swiss Championship in spring.

YCC Cruise 2009

2009 saw the third edition of the YCC "do it yourself cruise". This type of sailing outing organisation is intended to motivate participants at all stages, that is from choosing the destination, to chartering the boats, arranging flights, ordering charts and cruise material, etc. Moreover, lessons are organized for the cruising beginners on: navigation, signals, chart reading, and a full lesson were devoted this year to tides and currents.

The cruising season started off already in the cold month of February with a 'winter evening on cruises and sea sailing' that was attended by about 50 members. There we learned, among other subjects, about the challenges of sailing in cold waters and how to get RYA qualifications (details of the presentations in http://cern.ch/yachting/Lectures/).

Probably inspired by those presentations the YCC cruise has indeed headed north this year: following 2 years of 'warm waters sailing', that is the 2007 Corsica outing and 2008 to Croatia, in 2009 participants agreed to Skipper Rob's suggestions of 'stepping up' to an outing on the Atlantic.

The port of departure was chosen to be La Trinite'-sur-Mer, and we agreed on sailing during the first week of June. Two boats (a Grand Soleil 37 and a Sun Fast 37) were chartered, with 5 crew of board each. The idea being from the beginning to provide training to everybody, from the more experienced to the newbie's. And an excellent training it was for everybody, tide and current calculations, in some occasion night sailing, and the usual YCC challenge of acquiring fresh fish from local fishermen!

Finally after a week of sailing in exceptionally mild conditions we sailed about 250 nm around the bay of Quiberon, Belle Ille, Houat, and a mandatory visit to the 'sailing Mecca', Iles de Glenans.

The regatta will start from the port of Genoa and finish in Trapani, Sicily. The sailors will have the opportunity to mingle with crews from all over Europe after the race and visit Erice - a historic town near Trapani. We then set sail off east toward Aeolian Isles to sniff the smell of sulphur from Vulcano volcano. Then back west where we finish in Palermo. The cruise takes place from April 10 to 21, 2010. The cost for YCC members is CHF 900 not including travel to Genoa and back from Palermo.

And the learning benefit of both events was enormous!

YCC Internal Regattas

This year we had planned 9 internal regattas, and succeeded to have 8, with one cancelled for lack of wind despite the eagerness of the participants.

The calendar was quite usual – the Monthly regattas (from April to October) and two additional events: one for dinghies and catamarans only (the *Traversée du Lac* in June) and one for keelboats (Versoix-Founex race). It is worth noting that, as in previous years, some of the monthly regattas have special formulas. The very popular Drag race (Monthly regatta in September), for example, is a series of eight to twelve very short races (50-100 m.), where obviously a good start is crucial. Monthly regatta in August is quite the opposite – there is just one race lasting 3 hours, during which boats try to complete as many laps as possible (hence the name: *3-heures de Versoix*).

The club depends on its members, and club activities – including regattas – will only be as good and lively as we all make them with our work. Thanks to the help and dedication of our individual regatta organizers, motorboat drivers and crewmembers and additional helpers, this year's regattas have been a good success and we didn't have to cancel any event for lack of volunteers (although, it must be said for the record that some arm-twisting was used).

If you are interested in helping with regatta organization, and want to see our regatta tradition continue, please think about helping for the next season: this can be an excellent opportunity to learn how to organize a regatta!


The racing season was long: from mid April to mid October (with the last regatta being almost puredinghy event despite cold weather!), active, and exciting (except, of course, for little-wind days...). And good news: there were no major collisions or accidents.

Regatta participation in 2009 was the highest since 2003, with a dinghy participation maintaining the peak values of the last three years, and an historical minimum on the keelboat participation. Many new faces have contributed to the liveliness of these events.

Profiting of the brand new Surprise, a racing team was formed for the Criterium Surprise of CNV in September. Unfortunately once more the wind did not collaborate.


The last outing of the season saw a group of 6 enthusiastic dinghy sailors' head to an external regatta in Bienne. This was also the first regatta for our brand new RS500 and was finally rewarded by some enjoyable breeze.



Courses

Preparation of YCC courses for the 2009 sailing season started by a review of the courses offered and the course flow. The 2009 course flow implemented can be seen below.



A total of 8 YCC courses were offered. These are classified in two groups "Level 1 and Level 2". Level 1 course do not require any prerequisite YCC keys and hence are suitable for beginners and new comers to the club. Level 2 courses however have minimum requirements in order to be able to register for the course. In this new structure the requirement to enter the Su course and GS course was made equivalent (Y key plus any other YCC license).

One major addition to the new course flow was the addition of a brand new Level 1 course called "Competent Crew". The competent crew course is aimed at students who wish to gain an understanding of sailing techniques and become effective as crewmembers on a yacht. It is perfect preparation for a cruise for example. It is also very good preparation students intending to progress to courses on the Surprise or Gib Sea. It is different however to the other YCC courses in that it focuses on good sailing practices across a broad range of keelboats instead of skippering qualities for a given class of boat. The CC course contains 8 outings divided equally between the Surprise and GibSea.

Selection of students for courses was done by a lottery system organised by Rob Veenhof. The lottery itself was done on the 2nd of April. The table below summaries the lottery in terms of applicant and places allocated per course.

In total 194 active applicants for 82 places. Of these, 94 have a CERN email address, 9 have an address in a UN agency and 91 have other addresses; 65 live in France, 125 in Switzerland and 4 elsewhere.

As in previous years the demand for level 1 course was huge. This was somewhat eased by the introduction of the CC course which offers an additional 12 places to newcomers in the club. Despite this however, the Dinghy and Yngling courses were still heavily oversubscribed.

The heavy oversubscription to YCC courses inevitably leads to disappointment among many applicants who are not allocated a place. In light of this, a special alliance was set-up between the YCC and the Club Nautique De Versoix (CNV) also located in Port Choiseul. Students on the dinghy waiting list were offered a chance to take dinghy courses with a professional instructor from the CNV using CNV 420 dinghies. The students would also be full YCC members having access to the YCC theory classes, social events and Thursday training sessions. The alliance allowed for an extra 20 places for dinghy sailing courses to be offered. The CNV sailing course itself consisted of 5 outings with 2 students per dinghy. There were 2 groups of 10 students per group.

The YCC/CNV alliance was a big success in that extra 20 students obtained training on dinghies and it built strong links between the YCC and the CNV. However, the 5 outings were not sufficient to bring all students up to the level of being able to pass the YCC dinghy test. For this extra training weekends were organized by the YCC. The result was a large increase in the number of D licenses attributed for the year. This was made possible by the incredible enthusiasm and commitment of the YCC dinghy teaching community.

YCC testing was carried out throughout the season. The table below summarises the status of tests passed this year and compares that result with previous years.






