#### **OUR CLUB IS GROWING**

The club is very happy and proud to announce that the threshold of **400 active members** has been reached! It welcomes **104 new members** this season, which represents another achievement!

#### THE PRESIDENT'S WORD

The club has now a new constitution and a new set of rules. However often committee members receive requests to address issues which should not lead to additional rules as we would like to keep a lightweight set of rules covering the essential functioning of the club.

The difference between an association (club) and a professional business is that in the professional business customers pay for certain services that are defined and guaranteed while in the club members pay a membership fee which is then spent by the members to achieve a common goal. Therefore, the club member's obligation is not only to pay a membership fee but also to contribute to the club's life and operation.

This year we have welcomed an impressive number of new members representing more than 25% of the total members and it is an opportunity to explain again the club's culture.

The season is now running full steam and many boats (mainly Keelboats and Ynglings) are taken out more than 10 times each week. If we estimate that something on a boat breaks every 10 outings, there is, in average, a repair action on every boat every week. This requires a huge amount of time from the maintenance coordinators to organize the repair and a constant effort to identify volunteers willing to do maintenance operations.

This heavy work was again expressed during the last committee meeting and led the committee to compile the list of points below that highlights the

**club's etiquette** when sailing, when reserving and maintaining boats, and when handling incidents:

- 1. Take good care of the boat to minimise the risk of damage. If damage does happen during your outing or if you observe some prior damage, ask yourself if you are able fix it many repairs are within your reach and it is fun to learn in the process! If the repair is more complex and you are not qualified, how can you help to fix it? In any case report the damage in the logbook, but don't stop there.
- 2. Whenever a boat appears in the logbook in warning (yellow) mode, a maintenance action is required. It is important that every member taking out this boat feels the obligation to initiate and follow-up the required repair, even despite the warning allows the boat to be used. There have been several cases of boats taken by many skippers over several weeks without making the effort of organizing the repair. This increases the risk of lowering the security on the boat by lack of maintenance and shows a lack of understanding from members that they are also responsible for the maintenance of the boats. We all understand that certain types of maintenance need specific skills requiring the maintenance coordinator to be contacted, however, repairs within members' skills (like replacing a missing shackle, lost fender, broken tiller extension, patching a damaged sail with the onboard repair material, sewing a ripped cover...) should be carried out immediately by the person noticing it.

Remember that the cost of repairs are always reimbursed by the club.

- 3. Sometimes maintenance issues mean that boats can suddenly be blocked from use, where safety is a concern or when work needs to be done on them. In such cases, if you had a private outing booked during this time, maintenance or other club activities (courses, tests, club outings) take precedence.
- 4. Fuel on keelboats is paid by the skippers. Whenever a skipper uses the engine

for a long time or distance (for example, when returning without wind or when transferring the boat to a different harbour for a regatta), s/he is expected to refill the tank.

- 5. It is unpleasant to see that some boats are reserved but not taken out or that the reservations are canceled just before the outing, because this prevents members from using the boats, specially for those extremely popular like the Ynglings. To respectful with other members, please cancel your reservation as soon as you know that you will not take the boat, even if the reservation gets released after 15 minutes from the start time.
- 6. Last but not least, a reminder that **boat** preparation for regattas is done by the skipper and the crew assigned to the boat. Do not expect the maintenance coordinators to do this work for you.

To help members participate actively in maintenance activities, the club plans to publish maintenance slots in the existing application used to register for surveillance slots.

Finally, the club needs more members with a towing hook on their car as we often need to move boats from the harbour in Versoix to BA5 at CERN. On this point, we have also clarified that there are no known issues when driving in Switzerland a French-registered car towing a Swiss-registered trailer.
